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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

The institution was established in 1984 with the name Government Degree College by Government of Madhya Pradesh. Affiliated to Guru Ghasidas University Bilaspur, UG B.A. and B.Com. commenced in an old Primary School building. NSS unit started in 1986-87. After 6 years survival, in 1990-91 finally shifted to own campus allotted land of 4.384 hectares. Awaited demand of the UG in Science and PG in Sociology approved and affiliated in 1996. NCC unit came into its shape in 1996-97. M.A. (Hindi) started in 2001. In 2008 affiliated to Sant Gahira Guru Vishwavidyalaya Surguja Ambikapur. The institution got new name Govt. Shyama Prasad Mukherjee College by official order letter no. F-5-65/2007/38 Raipur date 14.05.2008 of Higher Education Department, affiliating university updated same by notification no.259/academic/2014/Ambikapur date 24/01/2014. Change in the name of the college under section 2(f) and 12(b) of the UGC Act, 1956 has been made through File no. 8-75/2010 (CPP-I/C) May, 2014 by UGC. UGC college code is 201017 and AISHE code is C-9745. To fulfil demand of commencing PG, in 2013-14 M.A. in Political Science, Economics, M.Com. and M.Sc. in Chemistry has been started in existent premises on the basis of self-financing under the supervision of local Janbhagidari Samiti. The institution offering 03 UG and 06 PG programmes with 1980 sanctioned intake seats.

It is located at village Amatoli tehsil Sitapur district Surguja Chhattisgarh, letter no.26/A.Vi.A./2014, date 03/12/2014, office of the Sub divisional officer revenue Sitapur official certifies that is Schedule Tribal and educationally backward area. The peoples of villages of circumference of about 70 K.M are majority stockholders.

It has institutional and departmental library with compendium of more than 30000 books. Laboratories having experimental equipment, chemical, specimen etc. for learning through experiment. Adequate space and sports facility for football, volleyball, athletics etc. are potential of the institution along with cycle stand, green campus.

For imparting holistic development to stakeholders, 27 teaching and 14 non-teaching competent faculties are engaged. It undertakes extension activities through NSS, NCC, YRC volunteers. Moreover, the institutional IQAC and various cells and committees work as facilitators to make students responsible, social, success.

- Lack of staff quarters, separate girl's common room, additional toilet for staff.
- At present diploma courses are not in existence.
- Lack of indoor games hall.
- Lack of institutional boys and girls hostel for the benefit of outstation students.
- Lack of sufficient fund allocation for infrastructure expansion.
- Weak internet signal and mobile connectivity in the area.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

- The institution Government Shyama Prasad Mukherjee College Sitapur is a government college, comes under Department of Higher Education Chhattisgarh Government. It is affiliated to Sant Gahira Guru Vishwavidyalaya Surguja Ambikapur (Established by Chhattisgarh Vishwavidyalaya Adhiniyam no.18/2008) since 2008.
- The institution follows the rules, regulation, policies and standard academic calendar designed by the government.
- The institution tabulates institutional, departmental academic calendar in which all academic session, sports, cultural activities, extra curricula are specified with date and time.
- At present 03 UG annual system of examination and 06 PG CBCS semester system of examination are running, which are approved by the government. No Add on / Certificate programs is offering.
- Although the institution teaches syllabus and curricula prescribed by the affiliating university but faculties of the institution actively participate in BoS meeting and assessment / evaluation process.
- The institution includes professional ethics, human values, gender equality, environment awareness etc.

in its academic and activity session.

- The institution promotes learning through field work, project work, outreach, internship.
- Records of the students for such work is uploaded in college website in their concern department space.
- The institution is well aware about outcomes of the feedback mechanism. Feedback is obtained from stakeholders and analysed.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The institution is situated in rural and tribal location. Most of the enrolled students come from nearby rural areas. Average enrolment percentage of the students in last five years is approximate 64 %. Total number of enrolled students in current academic year is 1439 against 1980 sanctioned seats.

As the institution is a government institution, strictly it follows the reservation policy in admission (ST-32%, SC-12%, OBC-14%, Divayanjan-5%, Ex. Army/Service- 03%) as laid down by Government. ST category reserve seats remain full. Most of the ST category students jump to general open seats on percentage basis admission process, scored in 12th class.

As per the rule of government on last date of admission all reserve vacant seats are opened for all waiting list students, usually being a tribal location, it has been recorded that ST students get enrolled in bulk at last date. ST student average enrolment percentage is approximate 70% in the institution. By gender it is coeducation institution but more than 65% enrolled students are female.

In this galaxy of student diversity, faculties are engaged in one and all possible activities for student's positive progress. Over all student centric teaching learning methods are adopted to enhance learning experience. Qualified and experienced faculties are using ICT enabled tools and modern technology effective teaching. The institution has developed its own internal evaluation and assessment mechanism under the supervision of IQAC.

Faculties of the institution also actively take part in university and external evaluation process. Learning outcomes of the programme are communicated positively to stockholders. Success and position of the alumni in society is discussed in alumni meet, that reflects the actual outcomes.

Research, Innovations and Extension

A number of faculties have published papers, research articles and book chapters. Most of the articles are published in UGC listed journals. A research committee is put in place and attempts are in progress to get the status of Recognized Research Centre from the University. However, the institution has insufficient infrastructure for research activity.

02 faculty members at individual level from the Department of Mathematics and Political Science are engaged in research projects funded by the UGC and DST. 03 teachers have bagged awards for their paper presentations in research conferences at various levels.

02 faculties have done Ph.D. during the past three years and currently 05 faculties are pursuing their Ph.D. Degree. All teaching staffs have done their Orientation and Refresher courses. Recently department of Mathematics has organized a workshop in which there is also a lecture on National Education Policy 2020:

Vision for Higher Education.

Apart from classroom teaching and assignment, students are guided for social outreach and assigned eco-social burning topics for their project works. Students are encouraged to incorporate research culture and data analysis in their reports.

The institution is also actively involved in extension activities to help society by its services. The college has a unit of NSS and a contingent of NCC through which college renders social and community services. NCC and NSS students' wings of the college carry out extension activities with the help of Red Ribbon Club. A few of the programs include Blood Donation, Awareness of HIV/AIDS, Gram Swachhta Abhiyan, Tree plantation, etc.

NSS wings of the college has bagged many awards including the Indira Gandhi National Award. A number of extension activities are also recognized by the local authorities. The college has also received Commendation from Chhattisgarh State Youth Commission for organizing Youth for Ekatmata Competition.

The institution has signed a number of MoUs and academic linkage with the local and outstation educational institutions and research institutions to support the students through faculty exchange, student exchange and internship and placement and projects.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The college has campus of 10.83 acres and the college building is constructed in area of 1501 sq. meters on the ground floor and 600 sq. meters in first floor. The college has inadequate infrastructure and learning resources in the campus to achieve its objective of excellent education. The campus has nearly 10 class rooms, laboratories, library, spacious playground, and a seminar room with a seating capacity of 200.

The college has 03 class rooms and 1 seminar hall equipped with DLP projector to facilitate the Modern teaching methods to be adopted. Internet connectivity is provided through a Wi-Fi. College is also equipped with common rooms for girls, safe drinking water facilities etc. The campus is beautified by gardening. The present building is not sufficient to fulfil all the needs therefore we have clubbed many activities in single rooms. Recently construction of new P.G. building & an auditorium hall of worth 2.0 cr have been approved by the state government.

Library of the Govt. S.P.M. college Sitapur is one of the oldest Govt. degree college library in Surguja district. The collection includes more than 30,000 books, 75 journals/magazines. Due to shortage of space P.G. libraries are running through the respective departments. Previously only staffs/faculties have reading facility in the library. Recently a reading room (new) is constructed in the college. Apart from the printed books the institution has subscribed to e-resources of N-list for the use of the faculties and the students. The college also publishes its annual magazine which provides a plate-form for their creative writing of students as well as staffs of the college. The college also publishes its annual magazine Tulika' which provides a plate-form for their creative writing of students as well as staffs of the college.

The total expenditure towards books and journals in the past six years has been Rs. 6,25,020=00 with approximately about 2800 books/journals being added. Expenditure incurred on maintenance and renovation works in the college stands at about Rs. 32,45,442=00. The library is rich in books and journals and it is used frequently by staff, members and students.

Student Support and Progression

College is committed in providing the best infrastructural and academic facilities to all its students. The college website provides all necessary important information to students.

The institution facilitates Govt. scholarships to the students of various categories. More than 70% percentage of Colleges' students have been benefited by scholarships provided by the Government during last five years. In addition, college also provide scholarships through "Nirdhan Chatra Kosh" to needy students.

The placement and career counselling cell of the college organizes career oriented program and promotion for the students. Faculties of various departments regularly help the students and staffs for various competitive examinations. Due to which, many students and staff members of the college have cleared NET/SET examination, selected as lecturer and cleared other examination.

The institution also regularly conducts a number of extra-curricular and co-curricular events. Many of the students have participated in various cultural and sports competitions at state as well as national and have been awarded medals. In the year 2017-18 continuously 02-02 students had been selected for the shadow collector in Youth for Ekatmata Competition – I & II organized by Chhattisgarh State Youth Commission.

The institution has a student Union Council. President, Vice President, Secretary, Joint-Secretary of the student Union and Class Representatives are elected by students on the merit base as Govt. Orders. Students Union plays an important role in the activities of the college. In addition, the institute has granted membership of students in various administrative bodies of the college such as ST, SC, OBC cell, IQAC cell etc.

In addition, the Institute has constituted a committee to check 'sexual harassment of women at work places' under the direction of government. The Institute has Anti-Ragging committee consisting of male and female members of the faculty to keep a watch on the activities of the students.

Alumni network is strong and alumni meets are conducted. There is significant contribution from the alumni.

Governance, Leadership and Management

Vision of the institution towards an Excellence through Equity, Access and Quality Education and Mission of the institution aspiration to translate collective dream of the Community of the region in to reality, reflects in the governance implemented by the institution.

For smooth management and redressal of the issues, various committees are assigned right and power to make instant decision. Being a government institution, administrative setup, service rule, regular appointment, policy, regulation, infrastructure extension and procedure are incorporated as per direction of state government.

Head of the institution principal / in charge principal has financial and administrative power. Fund received from UGC, state government or any other body is utilised for the development of the institution as per recommendation of IQAC and staff council and audit of the utilisation is done as per norms. IQAC meeting is held at the end of every quarter to evaluate and assess the progress and outcomes.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

The institution is co-educational; more than 65% enrolled students are female. At the beginning of the session students are addressed to maintain gender equality, moreover year-round Anti Ragging committee and Sexual Harassment committee look after related issue.

To reduce the power consumption electric instruments and LED bulbs are used when needed. Solid waste like paper, used pen, used file etc. are collected in dustbin and stored in proper place for sale in down market. To make a dream come true of clean- green-pollution free campus, a beautiful green garden has been developed and maintained, entrance of automobile on Wednesday of every week is strictly prohibited, cleaning of campus on every Saturday of the week is in practice.

The institution offers 5% reservation for Divangjan on admission and take care of them, facilitate wheel chair and support if any. The institution celebrates national and international commemorative day, festivals and events of all communities to promote inclusive environment.

1.1.1 The Institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well planned and documented process

Response:

Institution has the mechanism for well-planned curriculum delivery and documentation -

Government Shyama Prasad Mukherjee College Sitapur is pure Government college, incorporated by Department of Higher Education Chhattisgarh, so mainly it acts in accordance with the rules, regulations and policies of the Government. It is affiliated to Sant Gahira Guru Vishwavidyalaya Surguja Ambikapur (Established by Chhattisgarh Vishwavidyalaya Adhiniyam no.18/2008) and it implements the Vishwavidyalaya's specified curriculum.

Although Government Shyama Prasad Mukherjee College Sitapur is committed to provide the distractive teaching and learning environment, healthy, friendly environment and skills for understanding, respecting of self and others, to learn to solve personal and social, educational problems, institutional issues and improving the overall performance of the quality of the college. So, all most possible steps have been taken by the institution to ensures the effective curriculum delivery through a well-planned and documented process such as:

- Usually in month of the May of every academic year, an annual standard academic calendar is
 provided by the Department of Higher Education Chhattisgarh. According to the Structure of the
 provided academic calendar, the institution reforms self-local academic calendar specifying the
 dates of commencement of the classes, local examinations, NSS camp, annual sports, annul
 function and other co-curriculum activities. It is published in social media, website, notice board for
 convenience of the students.
- Various local Committees and cells are reformed by the Principal, according to the recommendation of the staff council to ensure effective curricuum delivery.
- There is a local Janbhagidar Samiti in the institution, formed as per guideline of the state government. Committee collects set of internal exam question papers from subject teachers and centrally conducts internal exam as per schedule. Answer sheets are distributed to subject teacher for evaluation. After evaluation of the answer sheet of internal exam, subject teacher shows the evaluated answer sheet openly in class room to the student to observe their performance. Subject teacher guides students one to one for better performance, better writing skills and how to approach the problems in case expectation are not met. This practice makes the students to improve themselves in all respect before their final exam. Subject teacher submits list of marks and all evaluated answer submit to the committee for records.
- Subject teacher takes unit test after completion of a unit of the syllabus and evaluate the students progress.
- Teachers of the institute focus on departmental seminars, project works, home assignments, experimental assignments, field tours and evaluate the student's participation and progress.
- Although, the students fill up the annual examination form through online portal of the university, one set of examination form is submitted to the institute. Specially post graduate programmes like M.A., M.Sc. and M. Com based on CBCS, 30% weight is assessed by concern department and teacher in CCA format and marks record is send to the university.

- Our institute is an exam centre for university annual and semester exam. Annual exam is conducted in three shifts. For each shift institute forms exam committee to conduct the exam.
- The exam committee regularly checks the university portal and convey massage to students through notice board and WhatsApp groups. University generates admit cards (Hall tickets) and allocates the exam centre. Students can download their admit cards themselves and one who can not download, college provides them. Exam related complaints are handled by the principal and superintendent of the shift. The exam committee ensures the problem free and peaceful examination process by continuous proficiency and alertness. Exam committee verifies admit cards of the students as per the university guidelines. In case of any mistake or error in admit card, exam committee rectifies the issue after consulting the university exam coordinator. During the exam, exam committee is responsible for the peaceful exam process so institute appoints exam squad team. Exam squad team assures a healthy exam environment without any mal practice.

3.4 Extension Activities

3.4.1 Extension activities are carried out in the neighborhood community, sensitizing students to social issues, for their holistic development, and impact thereof during the last five years.

Response:

The institution has been organizing variety of extension activities in nearby locality, community and college over the year. The main purpose of such types of activities are to sensitize students to social issue of surroundings, which will help the student in understanding the societal issues and challenges.

- The students actively participate in social service activities leading to their overall development. The institution runs effectively national service scheme (NSS), Through these schemes the institution undertakes various extension activities in the neighbourhood communities. At present the strength of the NSS unit is of 100 volunteers. Every year the college selects a village in the vicinity to organize a special camp for seven days and extends its service in the village like literacy awareness, swachta programme, de-addiction, health awareness programme and other constructive works. During the last five years, the NSS volunteers have organized camps in Rjauti, Dhelsera, Beljora, Baneya, Udumkela etc. Several other activities were carried out by NSS volunteers which include tree plantation, water conservation, toilets building supports in the village, making paths roads.
- The impact of the service is that villages have got new green coverage, increased ground water level, clean roads and surroundings and importantly villagers learned the significance of the rainwater harvesting and importance of water conservation. The camps and awareness programmes have improved their understanding of various social issues.
- The NCC unit strength of 60 cadets has undertaken various activities disaster management, sentry duty, blood donation camp, flag day fund collection. NCC camp and activity teach the students discipline and serve to nation.

• Apart from classroom teaching and assignment, students are guided for social outreach and assigned eco-social burning topics for their project works.

Impact of extension activities in sensitizing students to social issue and holistic development -

The college is conscious of its responsibilities for shaping students into responsible citizens of the country and making them aware of social issues. The college provides consciousness to the students as well villagers about the significance of social issues like conservation of water, swach bharat abhiyan, environmental pollution, personal health and hygiene, road safety. AIDS awareness rallies etc. The college has also organised several social activities like Gram Swachhta Abhiyan, Tree plantation, Blood Donation camps, Blood Group check-up and Health check-up camps. The college also has organised awareness programme on human rights voter awareness programme. We also sensitized the students to the various social issues and social responsibilities which helped them in their holistic development as responsible citizens with moral values.

The institution, Govt. Degree college Sitapur was established in 1984 with B.A. and B.Com. UG programme. B.Sc. was commenced in 1996. Existing institution building was constructed by PWD in Government sanctioned and approved drawing of that time for UG college format and handover to college in 1990. As the no. of programme increased time to time, the institute is trying to increase its infrastructure and physical facilities systematically and continuously over the years. The institute has adequate infrastructural facilities like classrooms, laboratories (not sufficient) staff room cum meeting hall, seminar hall, playground, library.

Laboratory -

Laboratories for science streams are available but in old format. Botany and Zoology Department share single laboratory for their experimental classes in shift. Department of Chemistry conducts experimental classes in a single laboratory in batches for UG and PG students. Department of Physics is allotted a laboratory room for experimental classes and theory classes. Although each department is having their experimental devices, equipments, chemicals and resources as per required for syllabus.

Classrooms-

There are 10 classrooms with chair and table for students. These classrooms are used for teaching in priority basis for those classes, having large no. of students.

Computers -

There are 6 computers in the institution. which are used as per required.

Library -

The institution has library with collection of more than 30,000 books. Textbooks along with some reference, books, motivational books are available for students and teachers. They can issue books. The structure of the library is based on old pattern. Although library is accessed in systematic way as learning resources.

The Library plays a central role in enhancing the quality of academic and research environment in Education institutions. The college library is a place in the Institute where huge collections of academic books, journals, magazines, research projects, other knowledgeable books and newspapers are kept. These books are made available to the students to increase their knowledge and understanding on various subjects. The college library is an important hub of student life. There, student can check out books, conduct their research, find a quiet place to study, and maybe even flip through magazine/journal. The students can extend their search with use of internet, e-books, e-journals etc. made available in the digital library. The Institute library exhibits positive impact on the academic achievement of the student. Students can perform better during examination and placement as students are explored to the knowledge through various means.

Library of the Govt. S.P.M. college Sitapur is one of the oldest Govt. aided degree college library in Surguja district. The collection includes more than 30,000 books, 75 journals/magazines. During the last six years almost 2,800 books were bought. The collection of books includes documents covering a wide range of subjects from English literature, Pure Sciences, Arts, History and Social Sciences, Languages etc. Due to shortage of space P.G. libraries are running through the respective departments. However, presently the library is not automated with any integrated library management software.

Apart from the printed books the library is having access to e-resources of N-list which is a part of e-shodhsindhu consortium of INFLIBNET, where the users are given awareness and made to access browse and download e-books, e-journals, databases etc. The college library regularly subscribes to the National Library and Information Services Infrastructure for Scholarly Content (N-LIST) faculties and students of this college get access to over 31,35,000 e-books and more than 6000 e-journal's.

Previously only staffs/faculties have reading facility in the library. Recently a reading room (new) is created in the college. The reading room is well furnished to accommodate students at a time and provides conducive environment for study. The visitor's book will be maintained for students and staffs/faculties.
